The work you have been doing is a contribution to your own professional growth, a resource for your staff, and an asset to your agency.

Now we will turn our attention to Protective Planning. The purpose of assessing Present Danger Threats is to identify children who need us to ensure their immediate safety by developing and implementing Protective Plans.
