Workshop A

A - 1

Generational Trauma

Trauma is not confined to the experiences of a single individual; it reverberates across generations, shaping how we perceive the world and respond to it. Participants will gain insights into how trauma in inherited, its impact on individuals and communities, and its connections to complex PTDS.

A - 2

Trust-Based Relational Intervention (TBRI®) for the Whole Family Part 1

Trust-Based Relational Intervention (TBRI®) is an evidence-based parenting model and a family-based intervention designed for children who have experienced relationship-based traumas. It helps parents understand their child's perspective and the feelings underlying the challenging behaviors. Parents support their child's healing through providing research-proven strategies to help children feel safe and learn essential life skills. This session will give you an introduction and overview into TBRI®, an attachment-based, trauma-informed intervention that is designed to meet the complex needs of vulnerable children.

Private TPR/Adoption Legal Perspective

Join us for an insightful workshop designed to deepen your understanding of how to support private adoptions including private Termination of Parental Rights (TPR) and adoption cases.

A - 4

Ambiguous Loss, Unresolved Grief, and Trauma for Adoptees

At the core of every child's experience in foster care and adoption is the experience of loss. This workshop addresses the often overlooked and complex layers of ambiguous loss, unresolved grief, and trauma that adoptees face. This presentation will delve into:

- The concept of ambiguous loss and its impact on adoptees
- The multifaceted nature of grief in children who have experienced multiple layers of loss
- Effective strategies and tools to help children process and navigate their grief and trauma

A - 5

Supporting LGBTQIA2+ Youth in Their Identity Development

LGBTQIA2+ youth in foster care and adoption services face unique challenges in their identity development journey. This workshop is designed to equip professionals with the knowledge and tools to effectively support these children and youth in navigating their identities.

A - 6

Helping Transracial Families Nurture "Conscious Identity" Development

Racial-ethnic identity development can be fluid and it can shift from one moment to another, sometimes leaving adoptees feeling confused, betrayed, and abandoned from all sides. Many adoptees had a relationship to several identities before they were adopted. What happens when families and professionals struggle to preserve and honor those important truths about our stories? In this training, Cam will address and demonstrate how identities can shift, live contested, die on purpose, keep us anchored, and transform alongside us. Learning to nurture "conscious identity" can be a pivotal factor in an adoptive parent's ability to cultivate trust and relational attunement, which becomes a foundational orientation for empowering adoptees within and beyond their immediate family constellations. Join Cam for this interactive training and leave with an increased awareness about ways to practically support youth and adults through their adoptee experience as it relates to racial-ethnic identity and adoption.

B - 1

Assessing Capacity for Parenting Children With Special Needs

This workshop is designed to provide valuable insights and guidance for current/prospective adoptive parents, as well as professionals working in adoption and foster care. We will explore common specialized needs, hear family stories, and provide practical tools and strategies to assist attendees in exploring and assessing openness and readiness for specialized parenting. Vignettes from parents and adoptees with lived experience, self-assessment tools, and additional resources enrich this presentation to support families and professionals in their assessment processes.

Trust-Based Relational Intervention (TBRI®) for the Whole Family Part 2

B - 3

Healing Vulnerable Hearts: Understanding Therapeutic Techniques for Adopted Children

This workshop is dedicated to addressing the unique and complex needs of adopted children. Led by Lauri Budzynski who specializes in adoption-related trauma, this session will explore therapeutic techniques designed to support children who have experienced profound loss and change. Participants will learn how to guide and coach parents in the healing process, helping them to become active facilitators in their child's emotional recovery. This workshop will provide insights into creating a safe and nurturing environment where children can grieve, heal, and rebuild their sense of security and belonging.

Navigating Sensory Challenges Together

Join us for a workshop designed for supporting children with sensory disorders and their families. This interactive session, led by Laura Hewitt, an experienced occupational therapist, will guide you in supporting families through essential techniques to help children understand and manage their sensory experiences. Professionals will leave empowered with practical tools to support families in fostering a sense of security in the child's environment.

B-5 Secondary/Vicarious Trauma and Avoiding Burnout

Adoption work is both vital and challenging, often exposing professionals to secondary trauma. This workshop is designed to equip adoption professionals with the knowledge and tools to recognize the signs of secondary trauma and prevent burnout. The session will offer practical strategies for self-care, stress management, and building resilience in the face of ongoing challenges. Through insightful discussions and interactive exercises, participants will gain a deeper understanding of how to maintain their well-being while continuing to provide compassion, effective care for the children and families they serve.

B-6 Adoption Literacy

"We grow up thinking social responsibility is one thing, and it takes a new way of being to realize there may be more to the story, more to the people involved. Cam Lee Small, author, clinician in private practice, and dynamic advocate for mental health and adoptee wellbeing, brings lived experience and professional insight to the forefront of this training. Based on his personal journey as a Korean American adoptee navigating reunion with birth family and heritage, Cam teaches a practical framework for Adoption Literacy to lift our relationships, and our culture as a whole, into new potentials and breakthroughs. His work synthesizes personal testimonies with decades of research in a way that brings new life to intimate histories, living origins, and untapped possibilities, locally and worldwide. Regardless of your role in the community, this training will be vital for anyone who has ever wondered how their relational presence cultivates dialogue over silence, to nurture growth among today's youth, and compassion across our lifespan."
